Paris, Wednesday.

The official journal publishes the following promotions:— Marshal Bazaine to be Commander of the Imperial Guards, General de Fally to the command of the 8th Army Corps, the head quarters of which are at Nancy; General Sechruitz to the command of the military sub-division in the department of the Haute Garonne, and General Bourbaki to act as president of consulting committee on the regimental organization of the infantry. The official journal says the rumours respecting ministerial changes have never had any foundation. The ministers are at the present time assembled at Compeigne, preparing measures to be held before the Legislative Body. In reference to these rumours several journals are publishing inaccurate statements. The President of the Senate and the President of the Legislative Body have been summoned to Compeigne with a view to participate in the deliberations on the imperial decree which is to establish constitutional intercourse between the Government and the great bodies of the state. The Council of State have already taken into consideration the definition of the official functions compatible with those of a deputy; also regulations for the election of the electoral bureau and the general councils for arondissements, and of the municipal councils for the suburban commercial districts of Paris, the election of the municipal council at Lyons, and lastly, the Senatus Consultum regulating the action of similar bodies in the colonies have also formed subjects of deliberation with the Council of State. Yesterday evening a meeting took place at a public house on the Boulevards de Clichy, at which MM. Bancel, Jules Simon, Jules Ferry, and Pellatin were present. The *Gaulois* says that they were hustled, scooped, and hooted, and with great difficulty escaped from the room. The strike of the drapers' assistants continues.

The *Rappel*, the *Reformer*, and the *Revel* of this evening publish articles attacking the manifesto of the left. The *Patrie* says that the measure mentioned in this morning's official journals are not the only ones which engage the attention of the Government. According to the *Liberte* M. Raspail adheres to his resolution to go to the hall of the Legislative Body on the 26th inst.

The *France* says that an important Council was held yesterday morning, under the presidency of the Emperor, at which all the political pronounces now at Compeigne were present. It is asserted that the question of the convocation of the Legislative Body was again discussed. M. Schneider earnestly supported the speedy assembly of the Chambers. The rumour that M. Dronyn de Lhuys has been summoned to Compeigne is devoid of foundation.

LATEST INTELLIGENCE.

BY TELEGRAPH.

FRANCE.

Paris, Oct. 20.

The official journal of to-day says the Government has notified with deep regret the violent attack of the *Journal de Pays* against a Prince of the Imperial family.

A Council of Ministers was held at Compeigne yesterday. The Emperor presided, and M. Schneider, President of the Corps Legislatif, was present.

After the sitting several members of the Cabinet left for Paris, but will return to Compeigne to attend another Council, which will be held to-day.

Advices received from the Senegal settlement state that a military post on the frontier of Gayor, was threatened by the native chief, Laddior.

A convoy has been sent from St Louis to the above locality to provision the garrison and to put the place in a complete state of defence.

The troops serving as an escort to the convoy have already had two engagements with several bands of fanatics who are Laddior's followers.

The *Rappel* publishes an article, signed by Felix Pyat, urging that no manifestations should take place on the 30th inst, and advising the people to wait a more favourable opportunity.

THE JOURNEY OF THE EMPRESS EUGENIE.

Constantinople, Oct 19, Evg.

The Empress Eugenie left at this afternoon for Alexandria taking the direct route. The Sultan bade her Majesty farewell at the Palace of Beglerberg.

INSURRECTION IN DALMATIA.

At a dinner held after an agricultural show, at Bandon, on Tuesday, Lord Bandon, who presided, in proposing one of the toasts, protested against the statements of the *Times*' Commissioner with respect to the condition of the tenantry in Cork county, and their relations with their landlords. Lord Bandon stated that there were no grievances to be complained of, the relations of landlords and tenants being of the best and kindest character; and he suggested that there should be some public repudiation of the Commissioner's assertions.

The annual meeting of the Congregational Union of England and Wales was opened at Wolverhampton on Tuesday. The inaugural address being delivered by the Chairman, the Rev Mr Dale, of Birmingham, the Union passed a series of resolutions, one of which expressed the cordial sympathy of the Union for the members of the Disestablished Church in their difficult task of reconstruction, and welcomed her as a new and powerful member into the fellowship of free churches.

A story is current in Paris to the effect that M. Auber intends to write a dramatic scene, in which all the female celebrities of the time—that is to say, Mesdames Patti, Nilsson, Maria Sass, Maria Cabel, Carvalho, Bloch, and Marimon—are to take part.

The *Athenaeum* says that Mr William Michael Rossetti's new edition of Shelley's works will contain, among other unpublished pieces, large portions of a "Tragedy of Charles the First." The "Adonias" will be corrected from the original edition published at Pisa. Mr Rossetti's life of the poet will also contain fresh particulars, collected from private sources, and from a long unpublished correspondence of Shelley's in private hands. We hear now that the book will not be ready before Christmas.
