THE WITHDRAWAL OF GREECE FROM
THE CONFERENCE

The Liberte professes to be able to tell us that an incident of a certain gravity, and which was not unforezeen, marked the first sitting of the Conference. The representative of Greece, M Rizo Rangalhe, having been introduced, read a very moderate but extremely plain spoken note protesting against the posi-tion which had been assigned to Greece by only allowing her representative a voix consultative (i.e.), allowing him to speak but not to vote. The case, he said, was very plain. The question at issue was a quarrel between Turkey and Greece. It would, therefore, have been fair either to admit both to the same privileges, or to exclude them both; it was unfair, he contended, that Turkey, being a party to the suit, should have a seat on the jury. In a question of should have a seat on the jury. In a question or justice or fair play the powers were equal—what was fair for a great power must be fair for a small one. He, therefore, claimed to be admitted to the same privileges as Turkey, and, in the event of his claim being refused, notified that he was instructed to withdraw from the Conference. His claim being refused, he did withdraw.
