LONDON PROVISION MARKET.

(From Jones Brothers' receipt.)
Bacon—Imports of singed sides from Ireland 3,386, and from Hamburg 1,574 bales. Arrived to-day and on the way from Ireland about 1,580 bales. The demand for Irish singed continued steady during the week, all on the spot being cleared at our quotations, but the market closed quiet on Saturday. The arrivals from Hamburg were smaller and sizeable and light weights sold readily at 70s, 74s and 77s landed. Arrivals from America into London and Liverpool were 1,991 boxes against 705 in Liverpool in the corresponding week last year. Very little American here and but a moderate enquiry at 56s and 64s for singed sides according to quality and size, short rib- in middles 62s and 64s, Cumberland-cut 58s and 62s, and long cut Hams in salt 60s and 64s.

Beef—There is no improve in demand and prices remain unaltered.

Butter—Imports of Irish 2,451 firkins. Arrived to-day and on the way from Ireland about 2,960 firkins. From the Continent by direct steamers 11,059 casks were reported against 9,281 last year; from France via Southampton and Railway 15,305 packages against 12,464, and from America into Liverpool 701 against 902 last year. Although supplies of Foreign were larger last week and prices rather lower the demand for Irish was better, and some sales of all kinds were made at our quotations, we fear however the high prices now demanded by shippers will check further transactions for the present. To-day fine Friesland sells slowly at 114s and 116s, Zwolle and Kampen 100s and 108s, Danish and Kiel none, Bosch none, Leer 86s and 98s, Jersey 90s 96s and 104s, Normandy 90s 110s and 122s, and Morlaix 74s and 80s. The weather unsettled last week, to-day fine and bright.

Cheese—Imports from America into London and Liverpool 51,332 boxes against 37,897 in the corresponding week last year. There was a steady enquiry last week and arrival sold as they came to hand.

Hams—A limited demand for fine qualities of Irish, Irish-American not asked for.

Lard—Rather more doing in bladdered and keg without advance in price.

Pork—A few Pickled Middles are taken to supply immediate wants. Prime Mess very firm and in some instances higher prices asked.

LONDON CORN MARKET.

(Aste's Report.)

Market firm, and owing to a large rise in the country markets factors are asking a further advance of 2s on English and 1s on foreign. Fine weather, however, checks demand. Barley, beans, and peas 1s to 2s dearer. Oats 6d dearer on the week.

(Usborne's Report.)

Wheat—English in very short supply, and 2s to 3s dearer. Since Monday last some few some few samples of new quality, and condition inferior. Foreign maintains last Friday's advance of 2s to 3s on the week. Floating cargoes—Fresh arrivals: 31s paid for maize. Off coast—Flour, 1s to 2s dearer. Indian corn in large demand on the spot, and for shipments at 1s to 2s advance. Barley—Very little on offer and 1s dearer. Oats 6d, with good business doing.

LONDON PRODUCE MARKET.

Sugar—Floating cargoes selling at full prices; little passing on spot; refined inactive and easier, supply larger. Coffee—Rates unaltered; fair trade in native and plantation Ceylon. Tea—Fair business, no change in value. Rice firm; good demand.

LONDON CATTLE MARKET.

Beasts, 4,351; sheep and lambs, 21,470; calves, 278; pigs, 100. Beef, 3s 4d to 5s 6d; mutton, 3s 4d to 5s 8d; veal, 3s to 5s 2d; pork, 4s to 5s 8d; lamb, 4s to 5s 8d. Beef brisk at full quotations. Sheep more active. Little or no inquiry for lamb. Short supply. Calves slow. Pork maintains prices.

LIVERPOOL CATTLE MARKET.

The supply of cattle was about the same as, that of sheep and lambs less than, on last Monday. The demand for cattle was very good, at extreme prices for the best descriptions; middling sorts unchanged. Sheep and lambs were in full demand, at rather better prices. Prime beef, 5½d to 7½d; mutton, 6½d to 7½d; lamb, 6d to 7d per lb. 2,251 cattle and 16,591 sheep and lambs at market.
