SUDDEN DEATH.

On last Sunday doctor Thomas Enright, coroner, held an inquest at Rathkeale on the body of an old woman named Mary Singleton, who died suddenly on Friday night last; she was over seventy years of age, but never married. Her occupation was that of a nurse-tender. She was seen on Friday up to six o'clock, p.m., and appeared to be in her usual good health. Patrick Lynch, her next-door neighbour, was the first witness examined—he stated about half-past eleven o'clock on Friday night deceased called him over the partition which divides their dwellings, and told him to come to her assistance, that she was dying; he got out of bed and only half dressed himself, and called his daughter-in-law who lives next door, who on coming into the house found her partly undressed and laid on her bed quite dead. The jury returned a verdict—died of disease of the heart.
