LONDON PROVISION MARKET.

Bacon—Imports of sized sides from Ireland 2,897,
and from Hamburg 1,488 bales. Arrived to-day and
on the way from Ireland about 1,890 bales. Demand
for Irish singed was dull all last week and with the
exception of one or two favorite names prices were
1s and 2s lower. For Hamburg cure enquiry con-
tinues good at 73s and 75s landed for sizeable and
light weights. In Irish bale middles no transactions.
Arrivals from America into Liverpool were 1,892
boxes against 148 into London and Liverpool in the
corresponding week last year. American singed
sides are saleable at 66s and 70s, the latter price for
New York miled cured light weights. Short rib-in
middles are now held for 64s and 66s, Cumberland
cut is offered at 60s and 62s, and long cut Hams in
salt at 66s and 70s.

Butter—Imports of Irish 433 firkins. Arrived to-
day from Ireland 799 firkins. From the Continent
by direct steamers 9,360 casks were reported against
11,166 last year ; from France via Southampton and
Railway 14,084 packages 15,314 last year, none from
America. Demand for Irish is of the most trifling
description. Fine Clonmells were sold last week at
104s f. o. b. and a few 1st and 3rd Corks at our
quotations. Supplies of English make increase and
although arrivals of Foreign last week were moderate
prices further declined. To-day Friesland sells
slowly at 92s and 94s, Zwolle and Kampden 84s and
92s, Danish and Kiel none, Bosch 74s and 80s.,
Leer 84s and 88s., Jersey 89s and 92s., Normandy
90s, 100s, and 106s, and Morlaix 76s and 80s.

The Times' Second Edition publishes the following
from New Zealand :—"Dunedin, April 15—Tele-
grams from Napier state that Ensign Lavia, his wife
and two children, Messrs. Wilkinson and Cooper, all
settlers at Mohaka, were massacred on Sunday last,
by Te Kooti, with about 40 friendly natives, princi-
pally women and children. On the 14th part of the
force from Napier reached Mohaka, when Te Kooti
was found to have returned with his plunder the day
before, having lost about ten of his party killed. He
burnt the settlers' homesteads, &c., before retiring.
After leaving some cavalry, and a part of the force
in the district, most of the militia returned to Napier,
which is now declared to be threatened. The set-
tlers' families between Mohaka and the suburbs of
Napier, a district of about forty miles, have taken
refuge in that town."
