Wilkinson and Cooper, all settlers at Mohaka, were massacried on Sunday last, by Te Kooti,, with about 40 friendly natives, principally women and children. On the 14th part of the force from Napier reached Mohaka, when Te Kooti was found to have returned with his plunder the day before, having lost about sen of his party killed. He burnt the settlers homesteads, &c., before retiring.

After leaving some eavalry, and a part of the force in the district, most of the militia returned to Napier, which is now declared to be threatened. The sett lers' families between Mohaka and the suburbs of Napier, a district of about forty miles, have taken refuge in that town."
