BIRMINGHAM CATTLE MARKET.

There was a considerable increase in the number of
 beasts on offer to-day; they came to hand in good
 condition; the beef trade ruled heavy, at 4d per lb
 decline; a clearance could not be made. The market
 was heavily supplied with sheep, which met a very
 slow trade, in a few instances 7½d per lb was real-
 ized, otherwice 7½d was the top price. The number
 of calves was only moderate, late rates maintained.
 Fat pigs a moderate supply. Beef, 5½d to 7d per lb;
 mutton, 6d to 7½d; veal, 6d to 7½d; bacon pigs, 10s
 6d to 11s 9d per score; porkets, 11s 6d to 12 ditto.

BRISTOL CATTLE MARKET.

We had a very large supply of beef at our market
 to-day, but it was of an indifferent character, and
 best descriptions, to which the demand was mostly
 confined, were very scarce; choice samples realized
 from 70s to 72s, but indifferent sorts only moved off
 with difficulty. The sheep pens were well filled, and
 prices for choice wethers were very firm, 7½d being
 realized, but ewes and inferior sorts were neglected
 at 6½d per lb. Lamb sold well, and in a few in-
 stances 8d was obtained. The show of store cattle
 was short, and trade remains quiet, there being
 scarcely any improvement. The show of milch cows
 was very indifferent, and prices considerably below
 those at the recent fair. We received a rather limited
 number of pigs from Ireland, the consignments
 scarcely exceeding 400, but trade was quiet, and
 prices were easier, the quotations being from 11s 6d
 to 12s 3d for bacon pigs and porkers.

MANCHESTER CORN MARKET.

There is some inquiry to-day both for yarn and
 cloth, and the market is consequently not so much
 depressed as on Tuesday; but the offers are so low
 that little business appears to be passing.

DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET.

We have to report an increase of 500 beasts and
 2,200 sheep at our market this day. Although we
 anticipated a good trade from the English reports
 during the week, still in consequence of the very
 large increase in numbers, trade was dull, and sellers
 had to submit to lower prices, particularly secondary
 and inferior qualities, which sold at a reduction of
 20s per head on cattle, and 4d per lb on sheep.

Corn continues to arrive at our market freely; dis-
 tillers have commenced to purchase, and prices on
 Tuesday advanced 1s per barrel. Wool firm demand.
