At the recent consecration of a Greek church in Liverpool, the Archbishop of York was represented by two clergymen specially commissioned by his grace. The Rev Benjamin Clerk, vicar of Christ Church, Southampton, felt "aggrieved at the countenance thus apparently given by the Archbishop to a ceremony so full of superstition," and wrote to his grace asking if it were true that he was so represented. The Archbishop says the report was correct, and explains that "at the consecration of an English church at Constantinople the Patriarch of Constantinople sent a representative to the consecration, in token, not of agreement with the formularies and doctrines that would be set forth in that church, but of loving kindness and charity felt by him towards all those who call upon the name of Christ. I thought it right to commission two clergymen to render to the Archbishop of Syra the same courtesy which his brother archbishop had shown to our Church."

A German couple recently went to spend some time in Rome. During their residence the husband died and was buried in the Protestant cemetery. His widow set up a memorial stone, and caused to be inscribed on it the simple words commonly used by Germans, "Here rests in God," &c. This came to the ears of the authorities, and great was their indignation that any one should have had the audacity to suppose that a vile Protestant could be said to "rest in God." In spite of the protests of the German community, therefore, the offending stone was actually removed from the grave!

The "Carlisle Patriot" says that a controversy regarding the value of religious examinations in the Church of England schools in Cumberland and Westmoreland has arisen in a very remarkable way. Mr Fearon, formerly one of the inspectors of that district, lately stated that "religious examination was a farce," and that "the inspector never dares venture upon those parts of religious teaching which may be supposed to influence the heart of the child."
