Archdeacon Gould, in reply, said that he was much gratified by the good sense and respectful tone of the Petitioners. They asked nothing unreasonable. They must know that his great desire was to elevate the condition of the tradesman and the cottier, that for this purpose it was his wish that every cottier and tradesman should hold direct from himself—first, because it secured them from that tyrannical system of arbitrary eviction, which pious and patriotic tenant righters were loudly protesting against, but which, strange to say, as they all knew, they were the very first to put in execution against the labourer and the tradesman.

2nd—Because he was anxious that every poor man should have a piece of ground attached to his dwelling, which would enable him to raise his food on the same terms with the gentleman and the farmer. The Archdeacon in alluding to some instances on his property where the tenant right farmers opposed him in granting allotments of waste grounds to the labourers, deeply regretted this selfish and heartless policy, and stated were it not the wish nearest and dearest to his heart to promote union, love, and peace, amongst all classes of Irishmen, but especially his own tenants, he would exercise his rights as a landlord, and take the land from these who acted so unworthily; but nothing would induce him to take a step which might throw a brand of fiery discord between two classes so mutually dependant on one another as the farmers and labourers. In concluding, the Archdeacon besought all present to live peaceably and friendly together. He would take no further steps till he knew the provisions and details of the proposed Land Bill.

The people received this reply with satisfaction, as was manifested by their demonstration tendencies, which the Archdeacon requested in the most courteous manner to be suppressed.
