banks of that river and of the Suck. The Bill was introduced on Monday night, and as it has been introduced by the Government there probably may be no opposition. Eleven years have elapsed since the riparian proprietary on the banks of the Shannon brought their case, and the causes of it, under the notice of Government. During that time there have been three Commissions, five Inquiries, and a number of deputations to Lords Lieutenant and English Ministers. Watching and waiting, however, have an end at last.

A preliminary tenant right meeting was held on Tuesday evening in Banbridge, where it was resolved to hold a demonstration in that town on Monday next, to take into consideration the changes made in the Land Bill by the House of Lords.

The strike movement in Cork has virtually subsided. The employes of the Cork flax-mill have resumed work. They were refused an advance, but were conceded some allowances in time.

THE COMING TWELFTH IN MONAGHAN.—The *Express* correspondent says:—Flags are to be seen floating from the spires of the different churches throughout the county, with the single exception of the parish church of this town, which is in possession of the police. It is alleged that an application was made by the Roman Catholic inhabitants and the magistrate to prevent the flags being hoisted. Be this as it may, the keys were surrendered by the churchwardens, and four policemen put in possession of the sacred edifice and two at the gate. There is a feeling of triumph amongst the Roman Catholics.

THE PORTADOWN AFFRAY.—It is expected that Sub-Inspector Nunan will be put upon his trial on Monday next at Dundalk.—*Belfast News Letter.*

PERSONATION OF WOMEN.

On yesterday morning the parties in the case of the Queen v. Bolton and Park, appeared by summons before the Lord Chief Justice in his private room at the Court of Queen's Bench, Guildhall-street.
