NEWS FROM AMERICA FOR FRANCE.
Southampton, Wednesday.
The American steamer, Erie, from New York, with arms, ammunition, and war materials for France, has arrived off Cowes.

THE LUXEMBURG DIFFICULTY.
Count Bismark's note on the Luxembourg question has been read to the Dutch Foreign Minister, and, having been a party to the Treaty of London. The Luxembourgers have petitioned the King of Holland to maintain the independence of the Grand Duchy, and to protest against the conduct of the Prussian note.

The *Echo du Luxembourg* learns from Versailles that the annexation of Luxembourg to Prussia has been agreed to by England, in order to make Germany abandon her pretensions to part of Lorraine. The *Standard* calls upon the Government to help restore France to her place amongst the European Powers. This could easily be done, and thus prevent German as well as Russian insolence.

The *Post* considers that not even the shadow of a pretext can be assigned for the appropriation of Luxembourg.

The *Times* declares that Count Bismark should have submitted his case for examination and judgment to the cosignatory Powers, before affecting to repudiate the treaty. We can no more assent to a power claimed by Count Bismark than we could to the power claimed by Prince Gortschakoff. The first step, therefore, of the English Cabinet must be to repudiate the Prussian as well as the Russian doctrine.

The *Daily News* says the words of Count Bismark are generally the precursor of acts. The insidious and hypocritical charges of unfaithful neutrality on which the renunciation of the treaty is based, are pretexts as old as the lust of power.
