

...prayers being opened with prayer, the following 12, beside the churchwardens, were duly proposed and seconded:—William Taylor, Esq.; Captain Caulfield, Mr. James Smyth, Reynatulla; Mr. Joseph Smyth, Mr. Charles Smyth, jun.; Mr. Lynch, Mr. Jacob Miller, Mr. M. Ryan, Mr. P. Greeny, Mr. F. Weir, Mr. F. Smyth, and Mr. Wm. Writzer.

After some consultation as to the most effectual means of raising a Sustainment Fund in the parish, was generally agreed that it was better not to go to that part of the business until the resolutions adopted at the next Diocesan Synod were fully understood.

Then Captain Caulfield, who was very warmly received, begged to move the following resolution:—

“That we cannot separate without recording our strong protest against the manual entitled ‘Short Prayers,’ &c., as having a tendency to familiarise the minds of our people with Romish error, and to wish to express our hearty sympathy with that faithful band of clergymen in the diocese of Dublin who stood in the gap and protested against its circulation, and we consider that the Archbishop’s answer is evasive and unsatisfactory.”

This was seconded by Mr. Jacob Miller, and carried unanimously, amidst a deafening outburst of protestant feeling.

The meeting then terminated with singing and prayer.

#### NANTENAN PARISH.

A meeting of the parishioners was held in the parochial school-house on Friday evening, the Rev. Augustus C. L. Coghlan incumbent in the chair. The routine business having been concluded, and all who were duly qualified having been enrolled as vestrymen, the following resolutions were agreed to:—

1st. That having had our attention directed to a manual entitled, ‘‘Short Prayers, &c.,’’ now in circulation in the Diocese of Dublin, we desire to record in the very strongest terms our disapproval of said manual, and our determination to resist any attempt, whether it be made openly or insidiously, to introduce Ritualism into the Church of Ireland.

2nd. That we desire most cordially to hold out the right hand of fellowship to our dissenting brethren, and entirely disapprove of the reference made to their services in the said manual.

3rd. That we deem it most important that a substantial sustainment fund be raised for the maintenance of our Church, and pledge ourselves so far as we are able to contribute thereto.

4th. That we have entire confidence in the representative body of the Irish Church, composed as it is of the most eminent and devoted members of the Church, the majority being (as we believe) determined to resist every attempt to introduce Ritualism in her forms of worship or Papish errors into her doctrines.

#### ADARE PARISH.

An influential meeting of the parishioners of the above parish was held in the Church at Adare at 8 o’clock on Thursday, for the purpose of registering vestrymen.

The Rev. E. Herbert Taylor in the chair, assisted by Messrs. Thomas Fosbery and Gerald Doherty, Churchwardens.

After the enrolling of the Vestrymen the following resolution was proposed by E. L. Hunt, deputed, and seconded by Gerald Doherty, Churchwarden:—

‘‘We, the Protestant parishioners of Adare, in assembly assembled, protest most emphatically against introduction of a book styled ‘‘Short Prayers’’ those who have little time to pray’’ into the diocese of Dublin, by one of its clergy, as dangerous in its teaching to the youth, and contrary to pure reformed religion, and regret that the Archbishop has thought fit to gloss over portions of the Manual referred to. We further tender our thanks to Mr. Maberley for drawing attention to this dangerous innovation in his correspondence with the Archbishop; and we declare our approval of the faithful protest put forth by the evangelical clergy of the diocese of Dublin against that dangerous pamphlet.’’

Before putting the resolution to the meeting the vicarman strongly objected to the word ‘‘gloss,’’ and requested that it would be expunged from the resolution, which the mover and seconder declined to do.

An amendment was moved by Mr. Thos. Fosbery to the word ‘‘apparently’’ be introduced before the word ‘‘gloss,’’ which, on being put to the meeting, was negatived by a large majority, and the

## LATEST NEWS.

### THIS DAY.

#### FROM THE CENTRAL PRESS.

The Spanish Cortes at Madrid has been on yesterday engaged in discussing the election of a Monarch. No decision is as yet arrived at.

The Italian insurrections have been absolutely repressed. The arms of another band of insurgents, 98 muskets, and 4,000 cartridges were seized yesterday. General Garibaldi has as yet made no sign.

A ministerial crisis is passing in Sweden—three Ministers have resigned. Attempts have been made to form a new Government.

The will case Goss v. Hill, in which the Roman Catholic Bishop of Liverpool seeks to establish the will of a man named Holland, who, on his deathbed, bequeathed all his fortune to the amount of £18,000 to the said Bishop, was commenced today, in the Probate Court. It was proved that this will was drawn by a priest. The deceased signed it shortly before his death while almost exhausted. No provision was made for the wretched widow.

John Carpenter, the Croydon murderer, was today committed for trial by the Croydon magistrates.

The horse show opened at the Agricultural Hall, Islington, this morning, it is described as the finest collection of animals ever seen at Islington. The first prize in class one has been awarded to Sir Watkin Wynne for his Chesnut Expectation.

#### THE FENIANS IN CANADA.

Toronto, June 2.

General Lindsay has visited the camps of the troops engaged at Pigeon Hill and Trent River. He thanked them, in the name of the Queen, for their gallant services. Yesterday, at the latter place, he said there were regulars at both engagements, but that the work has been done by the Militia and Home Guards. General Lindsay added:—‘‘The President of the United States issued a proclamation, but it was of no use to you. A few of the United States troops were sent to the frontier, but they were of no use to you. They did not prevent the Fenians from invading your country, and gallantly your Militia alone did the work.’’

Prince Arthur was present, and thanked General M’Lachlan and his force in a short and spirited speech.

#### THE FENIANS IN ENGLAND.

Precautions against Fenians are being taken at Portsmouth and Chatham Dockyards. Men have been told off to perform duty all night, from the southern end of Portsmouth harbour to the upper part of Fareham Lake, where the powder-ship is stationed; and steam-launches and gun-boats are kept, with their fires backed up all night, ready for any duty. At Clarence Yard, Gosport, the two steam-tugs are kept with their fires backed up. Yesterday afternoon a complement of Marines was furnished for the eight gunboats, which are kept ready in the harbour for immediate use. At Chatham, last night, for the first time, a guard of Marines embarked on board her Majesty’s ships Sultan, Cerberus, and Gloucester, lying off the dockyard, for the purpose of protecting those vessels from Fenian attacks, orders to that effect having been received from the Admiralty.—These precautions will continue until further orders.

A Plymouth journal of this morning announces that, in consequence of information received by the authorities, special precautions are being taken at Davenport and Keyham dockyards against Fenian attacks or the effects of Greek fire. Steam launches cruise in the harbour all night.
