

South Coast Railway, yesterday, the train from the Crystal Palace ran into the train from West Croydon. The guard of the former, seeing that a collision was inevitable, jumped off, and fell under one of the carriages, cutting off both feet. Two carriages were thrown off the line, but no passengers were seriously injured. It is believed the guard will survive. The cause of the accident is supposed to be the too great speed at which the Crystal Palace train was coming down the incline. It is stated that the signals were quite right.

THE NORWICH ELECTION.

A narrow escape from a serious riot occurred at Norwich on Thursday night, as two processions, one Liberal and the other Conservative, became entangled with each other in Post Office-street.—No material breach of the peace occurred. As at present arranged all the candidates will go to the poll.

THE ECUMENICAL COUNCIL.

Both Houses of Convocation assembled at Westminster yesterday morning, being the last day of meeting. The debate was assumed on the question whether the joint committee of both sides shall be appointed to consider and report upon the grievance in reference to the Ecumenical Council presented by the members of the Lower House.

FEARFUL EXPLOSION—TWENTY MEN KILLED.

A fearful explosion occurred yesterday at Stonier and Company's colliery, Silverdale, Newcastle, Staffordshire. It is feared that 20 men have perished. The explosion took place about noon, when about eighty men were in the pit, the majority of whom escaped uninjured. Eight bodies have been discovered. The search is proceeding.

THE WATERFORD GUARDIANS AND THE HIBERNIAN MILITARY SCHOOL.—At a meeting of the guardians held on Wednesday Major O'Gorman proposed, and Napoleon Bonaparte Wyse seconded the adoption of a memorial to the Lord Lieutenant, praying for an inquiry into the management of the Royal Hibernian School, with a view of ascertaining whether proselytism exists there, and, if so, praying such alterations in the character, government, and staff of the schools as will satisfy the Catholics of Ireland that the Catholic children of Catholic soldiers shall not be subject to a system of proselytism, which the guardians believe exists in the institution. Mr. Wyse said the religion of Catholic children must not be tampered with. Religious ascendancy was gone, and all must be equal. Catholics wanted liberty of conscience, and would take no less. The Protestant members present agreed with the previous speakers. The resolution was unanimously adopted.
