The Bishop celebrant then proceeded to the altar, after which the consecration was read by the Chancellor and signed by the Bishop. The Bishop sang the *Veni, Creator Spiritus*, and the singing prayers, with changes suited to the occasion, proceeded with. After the Gospel of the day (St. John—ii. 13, 18), his Grace, Primate, ascended the pulpit, and delivered the sermon for the day.

He took for his text a verse from the 133rd Psalm, "Behold how good and how pleasant is for brethren to dwell together in unity." His Grace traced with great minuteness the history of the Church of the past, and in this noble edifice which they had consecrated to the service of the Almighty they pictured the fruits and evidence of His mercy.

He having concluded a powerful address, he then chanted the splendid music of the hymn, after which an offertory in aid of the building fund was made and realised a handsome sum. The service of the Holy Communion then proceeded with, the *Sanctus* and *Agnus Dei*, and the ceremony concluded with benediction. The entire proceedings were conducted, though the ceremony interrupted, through the connection with the service will be continued to-day and to-morrow.

THE EVENING SERVICE.
The evening service opened at seven o'clock with the singing of the psalm, the people standing, prayers and responses, the Psalms for the lessons for the day, the *Magnificat*, *Dimittis*, the Anthem after the Third and the Anthem after Evening Prayer, were then read.

The Bishop of Peterborough then ascended the pulpit and preached on the 14th chapter of the Gospel of St. John, and the two final verses of the service were then gone through and the immense congregation dispersed.

UNSALARIED MAYORALTY.—The *Daily Examiner* holds that the Corporation of Belfast held a meeting yesterday—the first since the election—when an animated debate took place on the Finance Committee's report providing for the salary of the Mayor. An amendment to this item was moved by Councillor Duffin, and seconded by Councillor Duffin. The amendment was ultimately carried by a majority of eight—thus abolishing the remuneration of some years past to the Chief Magistrate of Belfast.

ACCIDENT ON THE WATERFORD AND CORK RAILWAY.—Waterford, Monday.—A serious accident occurred on the Waterford and Cork Railway on Thursday night last, by a young man named Sullivan lost his life. The deceased was on a visit to an uncle in county Waterford; that he entered the train from Carrick to Waterford, but on being as far as Fiddown he was turned out of the carriage as he had no ticket. It is supposed he proceeded down the line on foot, and that the engine had run over him, mangling his body in a frightful manner, as it was found sadly mangled by the engineer of the 6 a.m. goods train passing up the line on the following morning. A post-mortem was held on the body on Friday, and a verdict in accordance with the above facts was returned.
