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There are no grounds for the rumour that Admiral Sir H J Codrington is about to give up his command at Devonport for the purpose of relieving Vice Admiral Sir Alexander Milne in the Mediterranean. The Flying Squadron, under the command of Rear Admiral Hornby, sailed from Sydney on the 26th ult.

Recruiting for the Royal Artillery by the Staffs of Militia Artillery Regiments in Ireland has been suspended.

Letters for her Majesty's ships composing the Flying Squadron, under the command of Rear Admiral Hornby, should be addressed to Hong Kong until the 11th of February prox.

The first batch of appointments to the Control Department was gazetted on Friday night. It includes only officers who had belonged to the superseded departments. We hope a Gazette will appear before any great interval.

The same fate which is in store for the infantry depot battalions will befall the Royal Horse Artillery at Maidstone and the cavalry depots at Canterbury—viz, abolition at the end of the present financial year.

Should any change take place in the Naval command at Portsmouth, consequent on the advancement of the present Commander in Chief, Sir James Hope, GCB, to full flag rank, it will not be made before April 1 next.

Two companies of the 80th Regiment are under orders to proceed from Birr to Clare Castle, to replace the detachment 81st Regiment.

The depot of the 2nd Battalion of the 16th Regiment will shortly leave Chatham Garrison to join the service companies on their arrival home from Malbourn. Information has been received at Chatham that the battalion will embark on Tuesday next for the homeward passage.

A board of officers is to assemble this day, under the presidency of Colonel Seager, Assistant Quartermaster General, at Drogheda, to re appropriate accommodation for the canteen at that station.

Surgeon Bradford, of the 2nd Battalion 16th Foot, has been granted leave of absence to the 7th April next.

The new recreation room for the use of the cavalry in the Royal Barracks is completed, and will be handed over by the Engineer Department for use during this week.

A distinguished company has been invited by the Hon. Artillery Company to meet the Prince and Princess of Wales at their Royal Highness's reception next month. Upwards of £1,000 is to be spent decorating the barracks of the Hon. Artillery Company, of which the Prince is Captain General.

Major Wallace, 1st Battalion 13th Royal Irish, has returned to Newry from Derry, where he had been on duty.

Lieutenant Nugent, of the Royal Engineers, has been ordered to Ireland, in place of Lieutenant Matheson, who is under orders to proceed to Halifax, Nova Scotia, as soon as passage can be provided for him.

Leave of absence has been granted to Surgeon Buckley, of the 54th Regiment, to the 15th March next.

The troops in the garrison of Limerick will be entertained by a series of lectures on "Natural phenomena" to be delivered during this week by the Schoolmasters to corps, illustrated by the magic lantern.

A commencement is to be made in breaking up the Depot Battalions stationed at Chatham garrison. Orders have arrived there from the Horse Guards for the depot of the 1st Battalion of the 2nd (Queen's) Regiment and that of the 1st Battalion of the 15th Regiment to proceed on Tuesday to Gosport, to be attached to the 2nd Battalion of the 2nd Regiment stationed there. The order will take a depot from each of the two Depot Battalions in Chatham barracks. It would appear from this order that the authorities intend to attach the depots of corps serving abroad to corps stationed at home. By the abolition of the whole of the Depot Battalions, it is computed that a reduction of £14,000 a year could be effected by dispensing with the staff now employed. Should all the depots be removed from Chatham, it is expected that the spacious barracks at that garrison which would thus be left untenanted would be occupied by regiments of the line.

Her Majesty's screw steam troopship Himalaya arrived a few days since at Malta, from Kingstown, having on board the 1st Battalion 17th Regiment, for service in India.
