

Supplies of Foreign are liberal at lower prices. To day Friesland sells at 116s to 118s, Zwolle and Kampen 104s to 116s, Danish and Kiel 60s, 90s, 130s to 140s, Bosc 70s to 98s, Leer 76s to 84s Jersey 80s, 112s, 122s to 126s, Normandy 100s, 110s, 130 to 142, and Morisix 90s to 92. The weather cold with N E winds retarding vegetation.

**Cheese**—Imports from America into Liverpool 6,769 boxes against 585 in the corresponding week last year. Stocks are light and prices steady for the finest factories, demand moderate.

**Hops**—Cold weather with the absence of vegetables check sales and prices for Irish of all sizes are in buyers' favor. Canadian pale dried, 12 lbs to 20 lbs of very good quality are offered at 76s to 78s.

**Lard**—Few sales reported last week in Irish bladdered or keg.

**Pork**—No enquiry for pickled middles. Prime mess sells slowly at 102s 6d to 110s for European, and at 90s to 95s for western and eastern American.

**LONDON CATTLE MARKET.**

British beef is firm at Monday's figures, and there is an improved feeling in the English market. Foreign trade slow and heavy at reduced rates. There is more business in the mutton trade, with a tendency upwards. Veal, short supply, with ready sale at increased rates.
