The question of the Conservative leadership is discussed by nearly all the London journals. The Standard considers there are three men in the House of Lords who are consciously and unquestionably superior to all others for leader of the Conservative party: One of these has just resigned the leadership; the second has declined, and the third must perforce, accept, or expose the party to the disadvantage of a nominal rather than real command, and the risk of fatal divisions. The Marquis of Salisbury is in many respects the man who would most naturally and fully succeed to the truncheon of the late Earl Derby. He is a born leader. The Standard speaks in high terms of his abilities, and trusts that no personal consideration ought to deter him from his path of duty at this crisis.

At the sitting of the Church Convention yesterday, the clauses of the Draught Constitution relating to the General Synod. from No. 4 to No. 15, inclusive, were disposed of. Various amendments were made, one of them being to the effect that the General Synod should meet every year, and not every third year, as proposed in the Draught Constitution.

The New York correspondent of the Pall Mall Gazette telegraphs that the bill for expanding the American currency will be bitterly resisted in the Senate. In the Eastern States it has caused general indignation, being regarded as another step away from specie payments.
