The Marquis of Salisbury is in many respects the man who would most naturally and fully succeed to the truncheon of the late Earl Derby. He is a born leader. The Standard speaks in high terms of his abilities, and trusts that no personal consideration sught to deter him from his path of duty at this crisis.

At the sitting of the Church Convention yesterday, the clauses of the Draught Constitution relating to the General Synod. from No. 4 to No. 15, inclusive, were disposed of. Various amendments were made, one of them being to the effect that the General Synod should meet every year, and not every third year, as proposed in the Draught Constitution.
