

...The area of the lands drained and improved is about 1,630 acres, at a cost of upwards of £10,000, the whole of which has been advanced by the Board of Works. More than thirty objections were lodged to the award, and evidence in support of each was offered and gone into. Mr Roberts, C. E., and Mr Fitzgerald, C. E., attended on behalf of the Drainage Board. The Commissioner having carefully considered each case, announced that the evidence would be laid before the Board in Dublin and the result communicated to the parties. The effect of the drainage operations in this district will be to increase the value of the lands improved by more than one half their original value. Landed proprietors similarly circumstanced with those in Kilmastulla would do well to avail themselves of the provisions of the Act of Parliament enabling them to borrow from the Board of Works for the improvement of their estates.

LONGFORD ELECTION PETITION.—At the trial on yesterday James Skelly, who voted for Martin, swore that he was present at a meeting addressed by Sullivan, and that subsequently Father M'Givney, Lausboro' Chapel, before Mass, declared him excommunicated, and forbade parishioners trading with or speaking to him. Thomas Casey saw John M'Keown distributing money to a number of persons, and heard that Pat. Owens, who voted for Nugent, was called for thirty-two half crowns. He subsequently saw M'Keown offering money in another district. Thomas Doyle, Longford, and Michael M'Gann, Kilshee, gave drink on priests' orders. The last witness changed over £10 for Father Leigh distributed amongst 300 respectable parishioners, including some voters. Patrick Armstrong, an elector, deposed that he got presents of money.

LONDON CORN MARKET.

There has been a moderate attendance, but disposition to purchase. Holders, however, still continue very firm. English and foreign wheat are without change, but little doing. Flour—Town unaltered; country and American markets command full prices, but sales of a retail character only. Oats—In consequence of more liberal supplies, tend rather in price of buyers. Barley, malting, fair demand; feeding sales unchanged. Maize again rather dearer. British wheat, 400 cwts; foreign—barley, 4,630 cwts; oats 21,40; flour, 730 sacks.
