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employed by the Railway Co., with wilful trespass on his land and taking away sand without any authority.

The man could offer no excuse, and Mr Gunn said he did not seek for heavy damages, but "leave was light," and he could not permit their taking valuable sand from his ground without authority.

The Bench only imposed one penny fine and costs.

Mr Curling, addressing the other Justices, said he wished to bring under their notice, the closing of the Newcastle Bridewell, which had lately taken place by order of the Summer Grand Jury. It was attended with the greatest inconvenience to the public, tended to retard justice, caused great embarrassment to the Police, and added very considerably to the county taxation. He mentioned a case which the master of the union workhouse brought under his notice the day before while presiding at the Board of Guardians. A man, in a drunken state, got a heavy fall in the streets of Newcastle, and was severely cut and bleeding. Having no place to put him into, as the police lock-up is only a cell, the police were obliged to take him a quarter of a mile to the workhouse for medical treatment, for want of a bridewell. This state of things could not be permitted to continue, and the Chairman drew up a resolution, which was passed by the Board, condemning the closing of the bridewell by the Grand Jury, which latter body, he said, was composed in a great measure of wise men from the eastern parts of the county—

Mr H M Gunn—"Wise men of the East" (laughter).

The magistrates unanimously agreed to the following resolution to be forwarded to the Lord Lieutenant and Secretary of the Grand Jury:—

Proposed by Edward Curling, J.P., seconded by J. C. Delmege, Esq. J.P., and unanimously resolved; That the Magistrates now assembled in Petty Sessions, desire to express their opinion that the closing of the Newcastle Bridewell is a most impolitic proceeding both as regards the inconvenience thereby occasioned, and the want of economy in the expenditure of the County funds; and they direct their clerk to forward a copy of this resolution to his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, and also to the Secretary of the Grand Jury, with a request that he will submit the matter for re-consideration, at the approaching Assizes.
