The Telegraph also declares that last night will mark a new era in the history of our country, for from it our children will date the real union between England and Ireland. We may now look forward, it adds, to the realisation in fact of what has hitherto been no more than a conventional fiction—the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland. The Telegraph does not doubt that the scheme will receive the Royal assent in substantially the shape which it were on issuing last night from the brain of the Prime Minister.
