

the real union between England and Ireland. At length, after years of padding statesmanship and skin-deep remedies for Radical disorders, a statesman greater even than Pitt—greater in intellectual calibre and in extent and variety of knowledge; greater in loftiness of character—has redressed the wrongs of centuries, and paid back to Ireland the debt which England has so long owed her." The *Telegraph* further says—"The deep, solemn tones of the Premier's voice never rang out with greater clearness and emphasis, and they literally seemed more sonorous and elastic at the end of the magnificent peroration than they did at the beginning of the speech. The effect produced on the House was most favourable. The Opposition received the general proposition with marked geniality, and the public may augur for it an easy and prosperous passage through Parliament." The *Telegraph* also declares that last night will mark a new era in the history of our country, for from it our children will date the real union between England and Ireland. We may now look forward, it adds, to the realisation in fact of what has hitherto been no more than a conventional fiction—the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland. The *Telegraph* does not doubt that the scheme will receive the Royal assent in substantially the shape which it wore on issuing last night from the brain of the Prime Minister.
