

Beef—Fin qualities of India Mess and Prime Mess are in moderate request and prices firm. No buyers for if.

Butter—of Irish 552 firkins. Arrived to day and on its way from Ireland about 350 firkins. From the Continent, by the same route, 4,481 casks were reported against 8,239 last year. France via Southampton and Railway 11,152 packages against 12,954, and from America into Liverpool 136 against 1,212 last year. Very sharp frost set in on Wednesday last and has since continued without improving demand for Irish in any perceptible degree, and holders are anxious sellers at our quotations. Should severe weather continue shutting out or greatly limiting Foreign supplies it would alter the tone as regards Irish, stocks of which are light here. In consequence of the severity of the weather the usual supplies of Foreign have not reached this morning in due course and we omit quotations.

Hams—All sizes over 8lbs and 10lbs smoked sell very slowly.  
Pork—Pickled Middles neglected. Prime Mess dull at 2s 6d and 5s per barrel decline on European and American.
