### CITY POLICE COURT.—YESTERDAY.

There were but seven charges entered on the sheet, being chiefly for drunkenness against paers.

A man named Moloney was brought in custody of sub-constable Hoare, who charged him with being drunk on the streets on Saturday evening, and also assaulted him when being taken to the track.

The prisoner was sentenced to seven days imprisonment in default of paying a fine.

Bridget Mannix was brought up in custody by one of the night watch, charged with being drunk on the streets on Sunday night and assaulting ather female named Liston.

The charge was fully proved, and the prisoner was sent to gaol for a fortnight, in default of finding bail for her future good behaviour.

There were five other cases disposed of, but they were charges of drunkenness, in which nominal fines were levied.

### THIS DAY

A blind man named Michael Ryan, his brother, Cornelius, a woman named Stenson, and a girl named Danagher, were brought up, charged with the George's Quay Constabulary with a riot in Johnstreet, Irish-town, on yesterday evening.

The blind man was seen to be banging Stenson's head with a hammer, while he held her by the hair, and the latter was seen smashing a cranium of another woman, named Catherine Ryan, before that with a large hatchet; Cornelius Ryan was seen to flourish an iron bar over his head in the midst of the melee, and the girl, Danagher, as proved to have committed an assault.

The blind man, whose conduct in court, showed that he is a person possessed of a fierce disposition, was sentenced to a month's imprisonment in default of finding bail, and the others to a fortnight's imprisonment.

The weapons were produced in Court and ordered to wear an addition to Mr. Hall's museum.

A mechanic named Ryan, hailing from Thurles, who has come to Limerick on tram was charged with stealing a watch and chain from a man named M'Donnell, at the Mechanics' Institute yesterday evening.

The taking of the watch was proved by an independent witness, and which was taken from the prisoner; but though the latter denied that he took it with intent to steal the watch, the Bench, in contravention of the Act of Parliament sentenced the man to a month's imprisonment, in default of sending him for trial to the Quarter Session.

A young man named Larkin, a mechanic, was charged by the head porter, named White, at the W. and L. R. Terminus with an assault, and tearing his coat, and obstructing him in the performance of his duty, this morning at 9.30, when the defendant was seeing off a relative who was going to Australia. The offence was proved and he was fined £1 with solicitor's costs.

Mr Ellard prosecuted on behalf the railway company, and Messrs. Howard and Golly appeared for defendant.

the recent change to the common hours of Chatham dockyard, it is understood that only the plumbers, the braziers, and the double fitters in the second class in the smitheries will have an increase—3d a day; other men, who were formerly "factory" hands, are not, it would seem, to have any increase.

It is stated in professional circles that Vice Admiral Sir Hastings Reginald Yelverton, K.C.B, is likely to have a command very shortly, probably in the Mediterranean.

The probable successor of the present Commander-in-Chief of her Majesty's naval forces at the Nore will be Vice Admiral the Hon Charles G J B Elliott, C.B, brother of the present Earl Minto, and brother-in-law of Earl Russell.

The report of the committee appointed by the War Office in August last, to consider the question of the suppression of colonels of her Majesty's British army by colonels in the Indian army has been published. The committee consisted of Vice Chancellor Sir W M James (president), General Sir C Yorke, and Lieut Generals Sir D A Cameron, R Alexander, and H Hancock, and they were by their instructions limited in their recommendations to "courses which should not involve increased charges upon either Imperial or Indian revenues." The report is signed by all the members of the committee, but General Yorke and Sir Duncan Cameron dissent from its recommendations as inadequate for an adjustment of the grievance complained of, and Lieut General Hancock has also signed a dissent objecting to various portions of the report. The evidence taken before the Committee, and a number of documents relating to the subject of their inquiry are given, the whole occupying 146 pages.

The Hercules will convey a detachment of Royal Marine Artillery and Royal Marines for disposal among the ships of the Channel Squadron.

The Lords of the Admiralty having determined to abolish "non-professional" writers at the dockyards are finding at least temporary employment for them in other departments. Two of these writers from Chatham have been transferred to the accountant general's office at the Admiralty; and an order has now been received for four more to proceed to London to be employed in that office.

The sale of metal stores at Woolwich Dockyard has terminated, most of the steel and iron having been purchased by Hainsworth, of Halifax, and Parker, of Leeds. The furniture in the official residences will be sold this week, and subsequently the timber and machinery will be brought to the hammer. It will be two months before the whole of the stores will be cleared.
