**Election of Coroner.**

**TO THE INDEPENDENT ELECTORS OF THE BARONIES OF LOWER CONNELLOE, SHANID, AND KENRY.**

**G**ENTLEMEN,—I have the honour to offer myself as candidate for the office of Coroner, vacant by the lamented death of Doctor Enright, who, by his talent, zeal, ability, and punctuality in the discharge of his duties, shed a lustre on that ancient office, and was also a valued member of the medical profession, which he practiced with rare skill.

Medical men being invariably elected to the office shews that they are in public estimation recognised as the fittest persons for the duties of Coroner. The university education which most medical men receive, and the medico-legal knowledge which forms an indispensable part of their studies, eminently qualifies them for investigating the intricate, and often mysterious surroundings of sudden and violent deaths, and enables them to guide and direct a jury with judicial exactness, in ascertaining the manner and cause of death.

If elected, my central position in the district will facilitate the expeditious discharge of the duties, and will be also advantageous to the taxpayers by diminishing the mileage, which forms no inconsiderable item in the emoluments of Coroner.

If, by the suffrages of the electors, I obtain the position of Coroner, I hope to discharge the important and responsible duties connected with it in such a manner as will give the greatest satisfaction and least annoyance to the public; while my acquaintance with the duties of the office, my knowledge of medical jurisprudence, and my professional education will, I trust, be sufficient guarantee that "Crown's quest law" will not degenerate into a "weary, stale, flat, and unprofitable" investigation.
