sworn to encounter, she conceived it to be her duty
to walk abroad to meet them. The Bishop of Man-
chester, who presided at the meeting, observed
that if ladies who had no home-toys sought employ-
ment in the way Miss Becker had indicated he
would be the first to welcome their assistance.
