most valiant soldiers of France the proposal for an inquiry, which had been demanded by Marshal Bugeaud, he left the decision upon the question to the next session of the French Assembly.

General Leffo, the Minister of War, addressed the tribune, and said:—The subject is most formal. Every day we surrender a fortress to the enemy before a Council of War. I shall regard to all the capitulations—Sedan, as well as the others which have taken place during the war.

After some further discussion, the Assembly passed to the order of the day.

M. Audiffat Pasquier called attention to the fact that the vote on the 19th was incomplete, and that it is necessary that elections should be held. In his speech he declared it to be the duty of the Assembly should issue an explicit declaration of the doctrines which lay at the base of the events that had occurred in Paris. A complete agreement ought to exist between the Government and the eminent man who exercise so well the full powers conferred by the House.

M. Ernest Picard, in reply to the Government, declared that the agreement had ever existed. He declared that the Government itself, in three months, should submit to the proposals of the Assembly in connexion therewith.

On the motion of M. Ducloux, the Assembly passed a vote of thanks to the efforts of the Government in quelling the conflagrations in Paris.

A proposal to erect a monument to the hostages shot by the Government, was referred to the Committee of Initiation.

General Trochu demanded that the members of the National Defence should be impeached.

The last remnants of the French army had taken refuge in the Bois de St. Denis, which surrendered to-day.

Numerous prisoners have been taken since this afternoon.

General Clinchaut's division has been driven from Paris.
