

strategic road from St. Cloud to Montebello. At ten o'clock the division opened an artillery fire on some guards of the Commune, who were on the high road of Neuilly. The soldiers fled in disorder, some of them seeking shelter in the houses and barns, and others retreating over Neuilly. The troops then re-entered the houses and disarmed the soldiers who were inside. The insurgents fired on the troops from the windows of the barracks, but no very serious result followed, because the General in command of the military has orders not to cross the city. It is not likely the insurgents will attack them. It is believed that sufficient force is not felt in the military forces to march on Paris to put down the insurrection. M. Thiers seems to have succeeded as to a final triumph for the Government and the Assembly. The public do not take so sanguine a view as the Executive. This morning all the gates of the city, with the exception of that at Neuilly, were closed, and the occurrences since then may indicate a continuation to be again cut. The fighting commenced from the windows of the barracks at Courbevoie was put an end to by making an attack on the village. The soldiers made their retreat by the bridge of Neuilly, the sole means of escape. At eleven o'clock the 2nd Brigade of General Bruat's Division, in reserve, made an advance, and an artillery fire was commenced at the moment the insurgents were retreating across the city. They had no artillery. The Assembly met to-day. It is said that, in an interview with the King of Prussia is being encouraged by other powers of Paris and put an end to the insurrection.
