The leading cures at Waterford reduced their prices for sizeable orders 4s. per cwt. last week and all other descriptions of Irish were offered at a like decline, demand was only moderate. Hamburg and Danish sizeable and light weights were offered at 58s., 60s. to 63s. landed, outside at 4s. less.

Arrivals from America into Liverpool were 1,828 boxes against 353 in the corresponding week last year. Singed sides offered at 54s. to 56s. sell slowly, short rib-in middles fetch 38s. to 42s., and bellies 42s. to 44s.

Beef—For fine descriptions of India Mess there is a moderate demand, lower qualities do not sell readily, and prices are irregular.

Butter—Imports of Irish 1,884 firkins. Arrived to-day and on the way from Ireland about 1,950 firkins. From the Continent by direct steamers 10,000 casks were reported against 11,032 last year; from France via Southampton and Railway 11,877 packages against 15,809 and from America into London and Liverpool 7,134 against 3,534 into Liverpool last year. Demand for Irish was dull last week and mostly confined to such descriptions as were obtainable at 110s to 114s per cwt. Some American of choice quality fetched 114s to 116s, inferior sorts sell slowly. The best descriptions of Foreign were rather dearer. To-day Friesland sells slowly at 126s to 130s, Zwolle and Kampen, 112s to 124s, Danish and Kiel, 116s to 140s, Bosch, 98s to 112s, Leer, 108s to 112s, Jersey, 112s to 120s, Normandy, 120s, 130s to 140s, Morlaix, 94s to 100s, Hamburg repacked, 70s to 94s, and Australian, 40s to 66s. The weather last week was fine, to-day showery.

Cheese—Imports of American into London and Liverpool 31,685 boxes against 15,705 in the corresponding week last year. Arrivals are liberal and demand moderate. Holders supported by New York quotations are firm at 58s to 60s for choice factory and for all qualities prices are fairly maintained.

Hams—Supplies of Irish of last season's cure are exhausted. A few of new cure are appearing and sizes 8lbs to 10lbs smoked fetch 100s to 104s.

Lard—Demand continues moderate for bladdered and keg.

Pork—Pickled Middles are not enquired for. Prime Mess sell slowly at irregular prices, holders being anxious sellers.

Replies have been received to the tenders of Navy Pork sent to the Admiralty on the 9th instant, by which it would appear the Government wants have been supplied at prices averaging about £7 10s per tierce and £5 per barrel. Exact prices cannot be obtained.

STREET PREACHING IN LONDONDERRY.—At a special meeting of magistrates, held in Londonderry on Saturday, to take into consideration measures for the prevention of the uproarious scenes witnessed for several Sundays past in connection with street preaching in Londonderry, it was unanimously resolved to carry the law into execution by the effectual suppression and dispersion of any attempt at tumult or riot on the following day.

PRESENTATION TO COUNT MOLTKE.—Berlin, October 14.—The Emperor has presented two of the captured French guns to Field-Marshal Count Moltke, to be placed in front of his country seat Creisan, in Silesia. The guns have already left Berlin for their destination.

THE PRINCESS LOUISE AND LORD LORNE AT INVERARY.—The Duke of Argyll's steam yacht Columbia arrived at Inverary on Thursday evening, bringing-back the Marquis of Lorne and Princess Louise from their visit to Kintyre. The yacht reached her old moorings at half-past five o'clock, firing two guns, which had the effect of bringing a large number of persons to the quay in the expectation of seeing the party come ashore. The Marquis and Princess, however, did not land at the slip, but were rowed in a small boat to the mouth of the river Aray, where they landed. On seeing the pinnace heading for the river, the crowd, not to be balked, set off at the double, and by dint of good running, managed to reach the landing place in time to see the Marquis hand the Princess ashore. Immediately entering their carriage, they drove to the Castle. Meanwhile the Duke's barge had put off to the Columbia, and returned with his Grace and the Duchess, who had in the afternoon proceeded to Furnace Pier, eight miles south of Inverary, and there gone on board the yacht. The only craft in the bay, the Kettle drum, of London, a trim little screw yacht, belonging to Major-General Stephenson, showed a profusion of bunting and dipped her ensign as the ducal party passed.— Scotsman.
