The continued barking of the dogs led their game, and they beat a retreat when the alarm was given, scattering about in all directions. Some of the men were found in bags, and more of them were found in the field between the barracks and the railway. It is thought that the men which have not been recovered were blown into the Blackwater. It was tried to force the gate, but the sergeant-major was apprehended by the authorities. It is believed that an outbreak was apprehended by the authorities, but they were telegraphed for, but they were eventually countermanded when the news became known. Of the men present—eight in all—one was killed and three in the neighbourhood of the barracks formerly noted as a hotbed of rebellion in or near Cork.

Monday Evening.
 Prisoners, whose names have already been mentioned and who have been charged with the above robbery, arrived here this morning, in charge of a strong party of police. Inspector Egan and Head-constable O'Sullivan, shortly after they, together with Sergeant O'Sullivan, were brought up at the barracks by Captain Coote, R.M., Mallow, R.M., Mitchelstown. J. R. O'Sullivan, County Inspector; Michael Egan, H. Dobbyn, Esq., Sub-Inspector; Townsend, and a number of the North Cork Rifles, were present at the investigation. Mr. J. C. Blake, appeared on behalf of some of the prisoners, but they were merely formally arraigned, very little evidence having been given, and was requisite to justify their removal. They were accordingly remanded—bail not given in every case—to the county gaol at Mallow, to be brought up again on Saturday next. There were all healthy-looking young men, of the artisan class, a few well-dressed and respectable looking men, and a train for the county gaol, Cork, was started this evening, escorted as in the reports. It is reported that a plan or map of the barracks and premises was found in the possession of the prisoners. One of the prisoners was a boiler-maker at Mr. Webb's flour mill, and it is said that the bags in which the flour was packed had been found bore Mr. Webb's name. No more of the missing men have as yet been discovered.
