with him until his death, since which period he con-tinued his service with Sir Vere Hunt, Bart, until within the last ten years, when he retired (although yet in perfect health) to a cottage built for him within the demesne. He was married to eight within wives, by seven of whom he had children; his last he married in his 103rd year. He lived in the reign of six monarchs, and saw, as he recorded before his death, five generations of most of the families of this county, of the vicissitudes of which honest John Leahy was the stationary spectator for near a century, and before his death (retaining his senses and perfect memory to the last moment) he declared that he never suffered a day's illness nor an hour's pain, unless for the death of a friend, or occasionally for the loss of a wife! His remains were interred in the churchyard of Nantinan on Sunday last, attended by the entire neighbourhood, by all of whom he was regarded and regretted.
