**LONDON CORN MARKET.—YESTERDAY.** Market closes dull. English wheat rather cheaper for out-of-condition samples. Foreign dull. Flour quiet, but unaltered. Barley is cheaper. Oats close quiet, at a slight decline. Maize 6d less money. Beans firm. Peas 1s dearer.

**DUBLIN CORN MARKET—THIS DAY.** Irish wheat neglected. Slow sales of barley and oats. Limited enquiry for foreign wheat. Maize and flour dull.

**SALFORD CATTLE MARKET—THIS DAY.** Beef in fair demand, and realised more, and in a few instances 8½d. per lb. was obtained, for prime heifers, but 8½d. was the general top price. Sheep moved rather slowly, but at an advance. The quotations were:—First-class, 8½d. per lb.; 2nd, 7½d. to 8d.; foreign, 7½d. to 8d.; sheep, 7½d to 9½d; calves, 9d. to 10d.

**LIVERPOOL CATTLE MARKET.—YESTERDAY.** The supply of cattle was about the same as last week; that of sheep smaller. The market was good for both beef and mutton, at higher prices.—Beef, 7d to 8d; mutton, 9d to 10d per lb.

#### LONDON PROVISION MARKET.

(Jones Brothers Circular.) London Monday. Bacon.—Imports of singed sides from Ireland 4,472 and from Hamburg 1,900 bales. Arrived to-day and on the way from Ireland about 1,550 bales. Favorite brands of Irish singed were offered at 4s. further decline last week and other curers in like proportion, but sales were slow still lower prices being looked for this week. Hamburg and Danish sizeable and light weights were offered at 54s and 57s landed, outside at 4s less. Stocks here are reported light. New Irish short rib-in middles and bellies offered at 58s. f.o.b. do not find buyers.

Arrivals from America into London and Liverpool were 4,495 boxes against 601 into Liverpool in the corresponding week last year. Singed sides are offered at 50s, winter-cured short rib-in middles fetch 40s and 44s and are getting scarce.

Beef—A dull demand last week for all qualities and as holders are anxious sellers, prices are irregular.

Butter—Imports of Irish 1,521 firkins. Arrived to-day and on the way from Ireland about 1,600 firkins. From the Continent by direct steamers 10,304 casks were reported against 10,866 last year; from France via Southampton and Railway 12,141 packages against 16,766 and from America into London and Liverpool 12,758 against 2,343 into Liverpool last year.
