THE HEALTH OF THE PRINCE OF WALES.

London, Friday.—The bulletins of the health of the Prince of Wales to-day are not quite satisfac-No unfavourable symptoms have appeared, but the course of the fever is severe, and it appears from private despatches that this evening the pulse of the Prince was extremely rapid, and that he was delirious. There is, however, as yet nothing to cause grave alarm; but the death of Lord Chester-field this morning, from the same disease as that under which the Prince is suffering, has necessarily tended to increase the anxious feeling which exists. The noble earl was seized with illness, like the Prince, after his return from visiting Lord Londesborough. The attack, however, did not commence until four days after that of the Prince, and it has throughout been more severe. The noble lord had, however, progressed favourably till last night, and the suddenness with which, in the end, he succumbed is necessarily a disquieting incident.
