SUDDEN DEATH OF JUDGE ADVOCATE-GENERAL DAVISON, M.P.—The recently-appointed successor to Sir Colman O'Loughlin, the Right Hon. John Robert Davison, M.P. for Durham, was found dead in his bed on Saturday morning at his country residence. To some friends on a visit, on Friday night, he had complained of a slight sore throat, which he felt sure would quickly pass away. The morning came and he was a corpse. It is believed that heart disease was the immediate cause of death.

MR. THIERS AND THE REPUBLIC—The *ersail Ves* correspondent of the *Daily News* writes:—The Paris Deputies in favour of Peace are in despair with regard to the prospects of conciliation. M. Thiers makes unconditional promises to maintain the Republic, and says that he will get into the tribune and even more emphatically than ever declares that he looks to the establishment of the Republic as the crowning of his career; but he insists upon the army entering Paris, and reorganizing the National Guards, which means disarming the Communal Guards. The Paris deputies say that Paris abhors a garrison of regulars, and that the National Guards will never peaceably lay down their arms. Therefore, though M. Thiers concedes the great practical point of prolonging pay to the necessitous Guards for some weeks an arrangement is scarcely hoped for.
