THE APPROACHING CAPITULATION OF PARIS.

A telegram has been received at the Foreign Office from General Walker, dated Friday, to the effect that M. Favre returned yesterday to Paris, and will go to Versailles to-day with his offer of the terms of capitulation.

There has been no firing from the Prussian lines since midnight.

Further information from Versailles is to the effect that the negotiations for the capitulation of Paris will be concluded to-day.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR A GENERAL PEACE.
