

sure return, showing that the receipts between 1st April and Saturday last, were £41,640,538, against £39,305,368 last year, and they were derived as follows:—Customs, £12,945,000; Excise, £13,737,000; Stamps, £6,226,000; Taxes, £415,000; Income tax, £1,807,000; Post-office, £2,442,000; Telegraph service, £475,000; Crown lands, £195,000; miscellaneous, £2,798,538. The advances repaid to the Exchequer amounted to £1,641,266, and the temporary advances not repaid, £1,000,000. The payments amounted to £45,348,673 against £42,957,616 last year, and these included interests of debt, £18,306,843; other Charges on Consolidated Fund £1,197,755; supply services voted by Parliament £25,374,075; telegraph service £280,000. Advances were made to the extent of £1,045,272; in exchequer bonds and bills 1,045,272; exchequer bills paid off £145,800, and the surplus income applied to reduce debt was £739,179. The balance in the Bank of England, on the 25th of Nov was £2,798,115, and in that of Ireland £727,200.
