

next. Yesterday a great meeting of all the branches of the trade was held at Greatbridge, to receive a report from the various delegates as to the decision of the men whom they represented. The votes in favour of accepting the masters' terms were 5 to 11. An attempt was made by a section of malcontents to prevent the meeting coming to an agreement. Great disorder ensued, and a member of the delegates left. The meeting broke up in confusion, without any resolution. An effort will shortly be made to reconcile all parties, and establish a board of arbitration.

The operative stocking makers of Dumfries requested their employers, on Saturday last, to abolish the frame rents, and all the masters have given in to the demand of the men. Still further demands are early to be made.

**WANTON OUTRAGE.**—A wanton outrage was committed yesterday at the office of the *Irish Daily Telegraph*, Cook-street. At about half-past eight o'clock some miscreant hurled a stone from the street at the lower window of the establishment and demolished one of the two large panes of plate glass that form it. Two of the clerks who were engaged in the office at the time had a narrow escape, the stone, which was an immense one, passing quite close to them. The ruffian who threw it instantly made off, and has not been discovered.—*Cork Constitution*.

**THE HOME RULE AGITATION MEETING IN LONDON.**—Sunday night a crowded meeting, chiefly composed of Irishmen and Irishwomen, was held in a school-room attached to the Italian Roman Catholic Church, Hatton Garden, for the purpose of forming a committee to agitate a question of Home Rule for Ireland in the metropolis. The chair was taken by Mr. P. O'Leary who, in opening the proceedings, remarked that the Irish people living in England were a lever possessing a great deal of electoral power, and they were now seriously thinking of electing, or at least supporting Home Rule candidates when they had an opportunity of doing so. The essential principle of the association was said to be to obtain for our country the right and privilege of managing our own affairs, and by a Parliament assembled in Ireland, composed of her Majesty the Sovereign, and her Successors, and the Lords and Commons of Ireland. Preliminary committees were appointed.

**THE LATE ATTACK ON THE LURGAN EXCURSION PARTY.**—It may be recollected, as reported at the time in the *Gazette*, that the Roman Catholic excursion party from this town, who were attacked on their way home from Tynan Abbey, in Portadown, had been accompanied by two members of the local police force; and, as this matter produced considerable dissatisfaction, it was hoped that the authorities would see fit to take some steps to show that such an unseemly proceeding had not their countenance. Accordingly, the matter was soon afterwards inquired into and duly reported to the proper quarter, the result of which is that orders arrived at Lurgan to the effect that Sub-constable Coylis, who is a native of Nenagh, county Tipperary, should be dismissed the force, and Sub-constable Walsh, who belongs to Navan, county Meath, who has been stationed in this town for a great number of years, should be fined £3 10s., have his name erased from the promotion list, and be removed to Silverbridge, in a remote part of this county.—*Ulster Gazette*.
