THE SECRETARY OF INCOME-TAX RETURNS.—The
Pall Mall Gazette has received the following letter
from the Board of Inland Revenue:—"Sir,—There
appeared in your paper of yesterday a circular which
has been addressed by some persons lately employed
in this Department to traders and other assessed
under Schedule D of the Income Tax Acts threaten-
ing the publication of the amount of profits brought
into charge. As this is calculated to excite some alarm
I am directed by the Board of Inland Revenue to
request you to make known that an injunction has
been obtained from the Court of Chancery re-
straining the persons referred to from the proposed
publication, and compelling them to surrender all
notes and documents containing particulars of
assessments obtained during their employment at
this office. I am to add this is the first attempt
of the kind since the commencement of the Income-
tax in 1842, and that additional precautions have
been taken by the Board, which will prevent a re-
currence of a similar act. I am, Sir your obedient
