

CROWN COURT—FRIDAY.

the Hon. Judge O'Brien took his seat on the bench at ten o'clock, when the case of *James William Henry O'Sullivan*, of Kilmallock, was not terminated on the previous evening. The defence was for a sum of 600 for loss and injury sustained by the plaintiff by reason of his leg having been broken in a street, in Limerick, where he had fallen off the defendant's car which had been conveying passengers to Bruff in April last. The defence was that there was no negligence on the part of the defendant, of O'Sullivan, and that the plaintiff had incurred the influence of liquor on the occasion. *Thomas Carey*, of Barrington's Hospital, Limerick, proved that a compound fracture of the leg had taken place, and that in his opinion the plaintiff would never recover the use of his limb. The defence for the defence having been heard, the Court, per *Veron*, Q.C., in an able and argumentative address addressed the jury for the plaintiff. The jury retired, and in about half an hour returned into Court with a verdict for the defendant on the several counts.

The Lordship then proceeded to sentence the convicts and prisoners.

John Marshall, mate of a ship, who pleaded guilty of throwing a boy overboard his vessel, was sentenced to nine months and hard labour.

Tuohy and *Julia Tuohy*, for robbery of a house near Sixmilebridge—six months; *John Tuohy* five years in Upton reformatory. *Michael Kennedy*, indecent assault near Lisheen, six months and hard labour.

John O'Connor, for robbery of lead from Mr. *Deech and Son*, of Ennis, twelve months and hard labour.

The Lordship then took up an uninteresting case of ejectment, which occupied the Court for the remainder of the day; at the termination of which the business of the assizes was brought to a conclusion. The Court then rose, and their Lordships will proceed to Limerick by first train to-morrow morning.

UNEXPECTED DELAY.

The Lordship the Hon. Judge O'Brien, who had occupied most of the day engaged in hearing the ejectment case of *Pilkington v. Scanlan* in the Crown Court, was compelled to adjourn the Court at a quarter past nine until eight to-morrow morning on account of the application of some of the jurors who had become fatigued. At eight his Lordship will resume the trial of the jury. The ejectment has reference to a couple of acres of a bog.
