

came up at full speed and dashed into it. The engine of the mineral train was thrown off the line and three of the waggons were smashed to pieces. There were a large number of passengers in the Doncaster train, and fourteen or fifteen of them were severely shaken and bruised. The driver, fireman, and guard of the passenger train were also injured. The line was blocked about six hours. The driver of the passenger train alleges that the signal denoted "all right," but the signalman declares that he exhibited "danger." He has been suspended.

The *North German Gazette* announces that the difficulty with Brazil has been entirely settled.—The relations of the two countries (it says) are as friendly as ever they have been. The incident which might have brought about a coolness has been arranged in so conciliatory a manner by the Brazilian Government that only the remembrance of the conciliatory manner remains.
