He appeared in the morning with a black eye and other injuries, and alleged to have received from two of the police.

Runkenness quite broke down, and both summonses were dismissed. He was fined 10s. and costs for his disorderly conduct.

Other persons were fined from 1s. to 10s. and costs for drunkenness and disorderly conduct.
