He would be asking rules in the dark if he anticipated counsel's opening statement. After that statement was made they would be in a better position to deal with an application of this kind. Captain Nolan would be afforded every facility for meeting the case made against him. The Court then adjourned.

DEAN STANLEY ON SILENCE.—At morning service Sunday, in the Chapel Royal, St. James's, the sermon was preached by the Dean of Westminster, who founded his discourse—an eloquent re-assertion of the value and significance of silence—on the words, "But He held his peace, and answered nothing." The preacher dwelt on the obvious and additional blanks to be found in God's Word and in the products of the ablest and best men, at illustrations of the wisdom of the course which Christ pursued before his judges. His silence, said the preacher, was the best reply. Look at the theological decisions of the early Christian Church. How full they were, and yet what great blanks there were in them! There were in that, as now, many who talked for talking's sake, on topics on which silence would have been better, and yet there were many things on which early councils and the early creeds pronounced nothing; such, for instance, as the Holy Trinity, to which they went so far as to forbid the imposition in the Church of dogmas relating to points thus open. All the greatest theologians and philosophers maintained a silence on certain subjects, as only the small theologians and philosophers attempted to answer every question.

STRESSING OCCURRENCE NEAR KEW.—On Sunday afternoon a melancholy accident occurred on Thames between Mortlake and Kew, by which two young men, named George Lillywhite, 20, and Derrick Smith, 23, lost their lives. Soon after the deceased, in company with a friend, named Peter Bissell, engaged a pair-oar outrig gig from boathouse of Mr. Williams, at Kew, and proceeded down the river with the stream for a row, nearing the Queen's Head at Mortlake they were passed by two steamboats, one on each side them and going in different directions. The occasioned by the steamers completely upset the boat, and she sank in full view of the on board. There were also three boats, with three parties, close to the spot; but no person attempted to render any assistance to the drowning who were seen struggling in the river for their lives. Three lads in a boat, however, although some distance off, caught sight of what had happened, and bravely succeeded in reaching the scene of the catastrophe in time to rescue Bissell, whose life a moment later would have been sacrificed. The unfortunate youth was conveyed to the Queen's Head, where restoratives were applied, and he is likely to recover. The bodies of Lillywhite, who is the son of a baker at Richmond, and Bissell, a painter, of Chelsea, had not been recovered when the report left.

ORANGE CROPS.—With regard to the prolific nature of the orange, the crops, more especially in an abundant season, are something really surprising. Twenty thousand marketable oranges from one tree seems almost beyond belief, but, as we have before stated, such is a fact; the branches have frequently to be propped up with wooden supports to prevent their breaking. Risso mentions a tree growing at Nice, in 1789, which was more than 50 feet high, and the trunk of so large a girth that it required two men with outstretched arms to embrace it. This tree usually bore from 5,000 to 6,000 oranges.—*Food Journal.*

COMMUNICATION WITH FRANCE.—The promoters of the scheme for the promotion of a tunnel under the English Channel were received yesterday by M. Thiers, who listened to them with much affability. He assured them that their project would meet with no opposition, but he could express no opinion on the matter.
