THE LATE DEATH BY DROWNING.

THE body of poor Connors was found on Satur-
day evening. Two boys saw it floating down
under Thomond Bridge and they followed it as
far as the Ferry Slip where some men went out
in a boat and brought it ashore to the Dead
House. The features were much disfigured, and
there was a deep cut near one of the ears where
it is supposed he struck against the Weir when he
fell out of the boat. Mr M J DeCoursey, Solr.,
City Coroner, held an inquest on the body on
Monday morning when a verdict of Accidental
Death was returned. The remains were subse-
quently taken in a hearse to Castleconnell to be
interred.
