THE MURDER AT PALLAS.

An inquest was held yesterday at New Pallas by Thomas Costelloe, Esq, Coroner, respecting the death of John Meehan, the farmer, of Scart, who was killed by the blow of a stone, with which he was struck during the fight between Reale of the "four-year-olds," and Gillooly and Whelan of the "three-year-olds." Gillooly was present in custody. Meehan was at prayers when Whelan and Gillooly were heard outside his house "wheeling" or defying the "four-year-olds." A young fellow named Reale, who belongs to that faction, rushed out of a neighbouring house and flung stones at them, and the witness believed that his brother, who came out to see what was going on, was killed by one of those missiles. The jury returned an open verdict. When asked to state the difference between the two factions, the witness frankly declared that he did not know what the cause of their quarrel was.
