## NEWCASTLE WEST BUTTER MARKET.

At Thursday's market there were 1128 firkins of butter presented for sale, this number being in excess of that in market the corresponding day last season, by 482 firkins. The highest prices given were 96s 6d for 3 qrs (mild), and 71s for 3 qrs (ordinary), with 1s 1d for every additional lb in the firkin, and which price were obtained by Messrs G L Sheeby, McCoy, L J Curtis, J Noonan and several others. The usual buyers were in attendance from Limerick, Tipperary, Kilmallock and Tralee; they bought up very quickly, and the entire quantity in market disappeared with the train at an early hour.—COR.

## TARBERT BUTTER MARKET.

**TUESDAY, 5th AUGUST.**—There was a larger attendance of merchants to day than for the past three weeks, and notwithstanding the fair in the neighbouring town of Glin, and this being the pig fair day in Listowel, there was a good supply of butter in market, which was quickly bought up at prices ranging from 76s to 79s 6d, not more than a dozen firkins having left the market unsold. Mr D Ryan bought the largest number, Mr Slattery and Mr Longbottom being the next largest purchasers. The butter brought into Tarbert market is of superior quality and cannot be exceeded in any other market in Ireland. A large attendance of buyers and a considerable increase in the supply of butter are expected on the next market day, viz: next Tuesday, 12th inst.
