He was bound over in his own recognizance to appear on Monday, but warned if he did so he would be sorry for it.

A poor lad named Patrick Saunders, who was employed as messenger in the Limerick Workhouse, returning on Thursday, from town, attempted to climb a rafter, and unfortunately fell into a water closet, from which he was removed nearly dead to the Hospital, where he survived a few minutes only. An inquest was held yesterday and a verdict of accidental death returned. It is said the deceased was affected with epilepsy.

The foregoing report is stated to be incorrect, inasmuch as the boy did not fall into the receptacle of the closet, but upon the flags, and having been subject to epilepsy, a recurrence of the attacks of the malady ensued. He was immediately attended by Doctors Cullen and Holmes, by whom all that was possible for medical zeal and skill was effected, but in vain, as the poor lad died in an hour and a half after he was removed to hospital, in which he was ably and assiduously treated.

An accident occurred yesterday evening, shortly after six o'clock, on the Metropolitan District Rail- way, between the Gloucester road and Kensington stations. An engine had broken down and an approaching train had caused a collision. No deaths have yet been reported, though many are seriously injured. The sufferers were at once removed to the hospital, the remainder being taken to their homes.
