 best soil, and he has also grown barley  
 for twenty years successfully,  
 the seed being due to the use of  
 these manures are 1½ to 2½  
 cwt, combined with 2 to 3 cwt  
 of superphosphate. The manures  
 should be finely sifted, sown broadcast,  
 and covered with the seed. The crops of  
 barley are considerably over the
