THE LATE DR. D. T. MAUNSELL.

The body of Irish Poor Law Medical Officers
have sustained no small loss in the demise of Dr.
Daniel Toler Maunsell, (uncle of Daniel Meares
Maunsell, Esq., J.P., Ballywilliam, in this
county) which occurred some time since, after a
few days' illness. During the life time of Dr.
Maunsell, as a County Limerick man and a Medical
Officer who had worked with untiring energy to
better the condition of the profession of which he
was such a worthy member, we have spoken more
than once of him in these respects. He was the
indefatigable honorary secretary of the Irish Poor
Law Medical Officers' Association, and, recently, in
issuing a circular to the members throughout the
country, the hon. treasurer, Dr. Albert O. Speedy,
of Dublin, thus refers to the deceased gentleman:—
"His (Dr. Maunsell's) place will not easily be
filled, as there was no member of the profession in
this country who so well understood the medical
grievances we labour under, more especially those
of the Poor Law Medical Service. The late Dr.
Maunsell for years worked at these subjects and
gave them the most unremitting attention. I need
hardly remind you it was he who originated the
Irish Poor Law Medical Officers' Association, which
has in a few years done good work. His idea was
then carried into effect, namely, the sending of
circulars, quarterly or oftener, to the dispensary
medical officers of Ireland, and thus keeping the
profession (at short intervals) informed of all ques-
tions touching their interests."

The Registrar-General's return for the week
