Mr. Mathew H. De Courcy, City Coroner, held an inquest at one o'clock to-day touching the death of a labourer named Michael Cornell, who fell into

FATAL ACCIDENT AT THE DISTILLERY.

of a labourer named Michael Connell, who fell into a "keeve" at the Distillery this morning, and was suffocated before he could be removed from the vessel.

A jury having been sworn, and the body viewed by them, the following evidence was given:

John M'Namara deposed—I am employed in Mr. Walker's Distillery, Thomond-gate; I was at work last night in the Distillery starting Indian corn into a keeve; I knew deceased; I was employed with him and other men in the Distillery; I saw him sitting on the keeve this morning about pastpast three o'clock; the keeve is covered with the exception of some few feet; deceased was employed emptying Indian meal through the hole into the keeve; while putting up a bag I heard a splash, and on looking around I did not see deceased on the keeve; I went to the engine man at once to stop the engine which works the keeve; the machinery was stopped, and Mr. Lockhart and Mr. Duff lowered a ladder into the keeve; deceased was about twenty minutes in the keeve at this time, and I assisted in bringing him out; he was then quite dead; the keeve is about 14 or 15 feet in depth; I saw no foul play used by anyone towards the deceased, who was a sober, steady man.

A juror—Was the deceased sober when he fell into the keeve?

Witness—Well, to the best of my opinion he was. He had only three glasses of whiskey and a pint of porter during the space of twelve hours.

The juryman—Three glasses of whiskey in twelve hours! That is the least any man can have.

Constable Tynan said he had other witnesses to examine, but he did not see they had anything more to say on the matter than what had been told by McNamara.

The Coroner said there was no necessity to examine any more witnesses, as it was quite clear the death of Connell purely arose through accident.

In answer to the Coroner,
Mr. Lockhart, of the Distillery, said the degrees
of heat in the keeve at the time Connell fell into it
were between 128 to 130. Connell was in the tank
about forty minutes altogether, and all the efforts
made to rescue him proved unavailing.

The jury returned a verdict of "accidental death."
