DEATH BY DROWNING.

Yesterday Mr. Thomas Costelloe, (County Cor-
 oner.) held an inquest touching the death of a
 small farmer from Cratloe, named Mahony, whose
 body was found on Thursday night lying in the
 river, close to Barrington's Quay. From the
 evidence of a number of witnesses who were ex-
 amined by the Constabulary, it appeared that on
 Wednesday night, deceased, in company with
 another man, were both returning home on a
 horse and car, by way of the Circular Road, to
 Cratloe. The men were more or less under the
 influence of drink at the time, and M'Inerney hav-
 ing pointed out to Mahony that they were in the
 wrong direction for home an altercation ensued,
 which resulted in Mahony driving away by him-
 self in the direction of Barrington's Quay. Nothing
 more was heard of the unfortunate man until his
 body was found, as stated above, lying close to
 the quay, and having a sharp cut under the left
 ear, as if the head had been in contact with one
 of the huge stones which are exposed at low water.
 Further down the river, towards Lord Emly's
 demesne, the horse and car were observed by some
 of the Strand fishermen, on Thursday morning,
 the poor animal having evidently made a gallant
 struggle for life, but without avail, owing prob-
 ably to the darkness of the night. The jury re-
